Family History Library Success! A True Story by Ann Baracker and Her Cousin Bonnie. Plan Now for March 3-10, 2019

So many genealogists dream about going to Salt Lake City and spending unlimited time researching at the Family History Library, but only a few make it there. Plan now to join fellow society members March 3 - 10, 2019 and become one of our group's success stories.

This past trip was Ann Baracker's first time at the Library. What a surprise when she found so much help and information about her Norwegian roots! Not only did she reconnect with one of the Minnesota cousins, but they also had experienced Norwegian mentors guiding them through their research.

Cousin Bonnie spent two days combing through the Digital Archives of Norway (digitalarkivet.no/en). With help, she was able to piece together birth, marriage, and death records for many of the family. She was also able to track the family's chain migration to Minnesota, even finding a picture of the ship many of them sailed on. What a treasure for all of the Ellendson descendants.



When Bonnie could no longer see straight she asked Ann to break away from her German family research and delve into Norway for a while. With a different genealogy mentor and armed with the

ancestral parish, Leikanger, Sogn og Fjordane, the research assistant said “I think I might have something to help.” He walked back into the book stack and returned with the two volume Leikanger Bygdebok, the farm book of Leikanger parish. Cross referencing the church records and the farm book, Ann and Bonnie were able to trace ancestors back to Tor who walked onto the farm in 1654. They chronicled his descendants as they moved from farm to farm and those who eventually left for America.

Ann’s amazing success was due to the seasoned genealogy research mentors who can personally walk you through what only the Family History Library has to offer. Come with us on our March 3-10, 2019 trip to the RVGS Salt Lake City Family History Library. You never know what family nuggets might be hiding in the books, online materials, microfilm, microfiche, and publications.

Beekman House Museum Family Life Tours

Jacksonville's 1873 Beekman House Museum is open to the public every Saturday through the end of September with a combination of tour options. New this year are Historic Jacksonville's Beekman Family Life tours—half-hour tours beginning every 20 minutes between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. on the first, second, and fifth Saturdays of each month. These tours offer highlights of the house, the family, and the Victorian Era. They are ideal when other tours are not an option or when individuals have limited time.

Beekman Family Life tours are \$3 per person. Victorian Days tours are offered every 15 minutes between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. on third Saturdays. The cost is \$5 for adults and \$3 for seniors and students. 1932 Living History tours are \$10 for adults and \$8 for seniors and students.

Living History tours are offered three times on the fourth Saturday of each month at 11 a.m., 1 p.m., and 3 p.m.

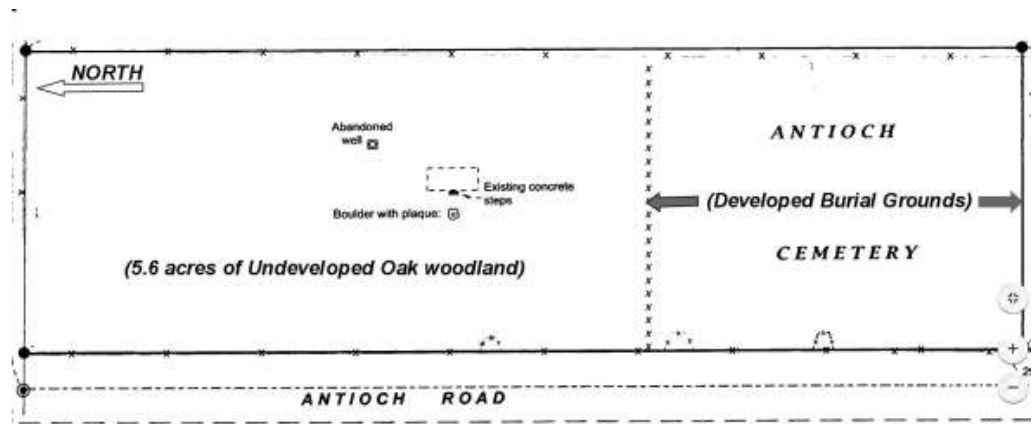
Haunted Jacksonville Tours

Antioch Cemetery: Found Unmarked Graves

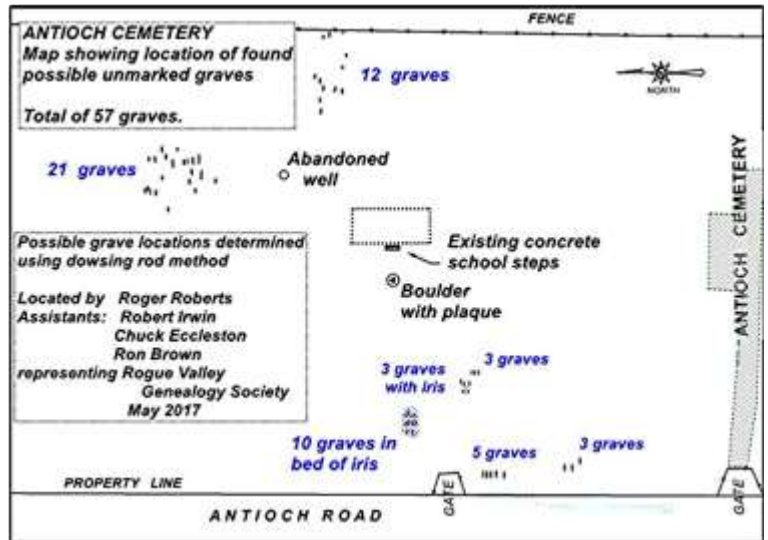
The Antioch Cemetery lies alongside Antioch Road in Sams Valley. As shown in the map below, only the most southerly portion of the property is an active cemetery. The north 5.6 acres consists of undeveloped oak woodland.



This was the location of the Antioch School, with only the concrete school steps still remaining. The Federal government acquired this land and surrounding lands to develop Camp White in the 1940's, and the building was removed at that time. The school and cemetery land were acquired by the Antioch Cemetery Association after Camp White was closed.

There have been rumors over the years of there being graves behind where the school building stood. Knowing that I am involved in searching for and locating unmarked graves, the Association asked if I had ever tried to locate them. I told him that I hadn't, but it might be interesting to have a look around.

I made numerous visits to the undeveloped portion of the cemetery land. Using my dowsing rods, and with the assistance of Chuck Eccleston, Ron Brown and Robert Irwin, we discovered unmarked graves. Not only behind the school, but in scattered areas among very large oak trees. The map to the right represents our findings. The final count was 57 possible graves found.



I have learned from experience to watch for certain plants growing where they wouldn't be expected to be. They are often used as markers for otherwise unmarked graves. For example, we have found graves marked with domestic plants such as iris and daffodils. Below are two photos of a large, well established bed of iris that we found on this project. A thorough scan with the dowsing rods yielded 10 graves. The Antioch Cemetery Association is now planning to mark the location of each of the 57 graves. A marker will consist of a rectangular concrete slab branded with the word "PIONEER" or "UNKNOWN", or perhaps "UNKNOWN PIONEER".
